TRAVELS





Consequently, they have relocated to a nearby building and continue to worship in town. We visited their new space, enjoyed fellowship, and discussed future plans.

Finally, we also visited the **Forest** congregation in Mbeya town. This is an established congregation in the heart of Mbeya. As one of the larger congregations in the area, we know many of the wonderful members there and enjoyed a great Sunday morning together. Our focus during this visit was sharing ideas on leadership and faithfulness.

While it might seem minor, there's been significant recent work on the main road to Ailsa Farm. As you know, we often call this road "Hamsini na saba," which directly translates "fifty-seven," referring to the fifty-seven hairpin turns leading up the mountain.

We are very grateful for the local government's assistance in this area. Traveling this road multiple times a week can be exhausting, and coming home sore is normal. Thankfully, this much-needed good news is a welcome relief!
